How China Newsweek changed the fate of 120 million hepatitis B carriers China Newsweek, Han Fudong (2003)

A China Newsweek investigative report exposed the widespread discrimination against hepatitis B carriers in China, challenging unjust employment policies and sparking legal and policy reforms. Not only did Han Fudong's investigation influence policy, it also inspired the film The Best Is Yet to Come (2020), which portrays the struggle of a young journalist uncovering systemic injustice.

Circle 19 at Perugia International Journalism Festival

On 11 April 2025, Circle 19 held a sideevent at the Perugia International Journalism Festival, moderated by Reporters Without Borders (RSF) US Bureau Director Clayton Weimers. During this panel discussion, spokesperson Kris Cheng presented Circle 19 and how this initiative is essential in countering the Chinese regime's narrative regarding journalists and the right to information. Discussions touched upon the dire situation in China, in Hong Kong, and the challenges faced by the exiled media communities.



Circle 19 spokesperson Filip Noubel with Global Voices organised a 4-day meet-up in Kathmandu, Nepal in late April for independent sinophone journalists from China and Taiwan and journalists from francophone Africa, South Asia, Central Asia and Southeast Asia as part of the 2025 cohort of Climate Justice Fellows. The 2024-2025 project looks at the role of China in Global South countries in relation to climate justice and allows fellows to cowrite stories so they can match their knowledge base, language skills and networks to produce nuanced stories using sources in different languages. The goal is to establish a network of practitioners from China, Taiwan and different parts of the world to improve the quality and independence of reporting.

Article: "Chang Ping's Observations: Is China's propaganda machine turning into 'Hyperthyroidism Bro' as well?" (in Chinese)

American streamer "iShowSpeed" (dubbed "Hyperthyroidism Bro" in China) has ended his livestream tour, but Chinese state media is still celebrating. Outlets and officials praised his "unfiltered" portrayal of China as thriving and peaceful, claiming it countered decades of negative foreign coverage. Commentator Chang Ping questions this narrative, pointing out that true unfiltered reporting isn't possible in China—especially for foreigners. While some saw the livestream's mishaps as proof of spontaneity, they more accurately reflect the ever-present control of censorship.

Last week, protest banners against Xi Jinping appeared on a footbridge outside Chengdu's Chadianzi Passenger Transport Station.

Commentator Chang Ping sees these protests as a warning about the rise of authoritarianism worldwide. Chang believes the biggest threat to the Chinese Communist Party (CCP) has long been the West's promotion of democratic ideals. After Trump became president, he abandoned this effort and embraced authoritarianism, benefitting CCP propaganda. The Chinese government's robust response to Trump's tariffs bolstered Xi Jinping's image as a strongman, which many Chinese and some in the West found satisfying, increasing demand for authoritarian leadership.
